# **2007 Award Questions and Answers**

Q. Award 12 calls for "dog heads", but I don't know where the head ends.

**A.** This is very similar to the same situation in people. It is okay to show neck but if one can see any part of the foreleg, then it would no longer qualify as a "head."

Q. Award 40 calls for "Most unusual materials.". How do we know that they are not listed?

**A.** By definition, it would be impossible to compile a **List of Unlisted** materials. Moreover, the award does not call for "unlisted" materials only, it was written to "most unusual materials." It is likely that many of the materials may fall into the unlisted category, but it's not necessary.

This is an award where the particular judges' individual discretion will carry a great deal of weight. If you, as an individual competitor, are uncomfortable with that then you should select other awards to enter.

 $Q_{\rm e}$  Award 45 calls for "Persons depicting occupations." Can one use a button which shows a person known for his occupation? Such as King Henry equals a king?

**A.** It would depend upon how Henry (or any other famous figure) is shown and depicted. If he is sitting on a throne or wearing a crown, then he is certainly "depicting" the occupation of being a ruler. If, however, the button is simply a famous face, then it is simply a portrait of a person. (Judges would give benefit of doubt on the question of whether being a king is a hereditary right or an occupation.)
